



"Katie Westby was something else!" "Katie will most likely be remembered as queen of the arts."

"Katie was a remarkable woman..."

These are all quotes said by various people about Katie Westby, a true civic leader of the Tulsa community and a former President of the Junior League of Tulsa. Fifty years ago, Katie Westby, along with other League members, established the Tulsa Arts Council, now known as the Arts and Humanities Council of Tulsa.

Today, the Council is a service provider to more than 60 arts and cultural organizations. In addition, it provides arts education resources to more than 62,000 youth, mostly from at-risk and underserved populations, each year in Tulsa County, according to Ken Busby, Executive Director and CEO.

As the organization sets out on another 50 years with the brand new 42-thousand square-foot Hardesty Arts Center currently under construction, they are celebrating their anniversary and Katie's legacy. On May 18, 2012 the organization hosted a gala called Remembering Katie at the Harweldon Mansion. It featured a French bistro theme, a nod to the French

film The Red Balloon, Katie's favorite. Guests were entertained by a 17-piece orchestra and an evening celebrating the arts. One-thousand red balloons were also released in her honor.

Ken Busby said, "I think we truly captured the essence of Katie Westby. It was a complete success and because of that, we have decided to throw one big party every year. Just a night of dancing and great food to remember Katie because Katie and the Junior League of Tulsa are who started it all."

In addition to helping found the Arts & Humanities Council, Katie worked tirelessly on the Tulsa Performing Arts Center and Tulsa Arts Commission. In 1969, Katie was responsible for helping to pass an ordinance that 1 percent of the cost of a building, paid for by city of Tulsa taxpayers is designated to public art.

"She wanted Tulsa to be a home for the arts. That was always in her mind -- how could she improve the quality of life for residents and for visitors to Tulsa. Her gift was a belief in the power of the arts and that everyone deserved to have access to them," Busby said.


The historic Westby House at the



longtime supporter of TU and served on the Board of Trustees. The Junior League of Tulsa also has a Westby room, located at the Headquarters building, named for her contributions.

And get this—according to the Oklahoma Heritage Association, from 1946 to 1973, Katie Westby served as a member, chairman, president, secretary, or director of nearly 50 different organizations on the local, state, and national levels.

There's no doubt Katie Westby left behind quite a legacy and we're proud to say she was a part of the Junior League of

Confidence, contacts and ability

In 2006, my family moved home to Tulsa where most of my friends were already members of JLT. I wanted to get involved, but I was also pregnant with my third child, in addition to having a two and three year old. However, I decided it was time to join the Provisional class. Since then, balancing all of my responsibilities seems like a juggling act, but definitely worth the effort.

I have a heart for public service. I was immediately drawn to placements within JLT that would provide me with opportunities to serve others. Ever since my first active year, I have chaired a committee. My first experience was to chair "Kids in the Kitchen" on the IMPACT committee. At the time, it was a new program for the Association of Junior Leagues International,

Inc. (AJLI) with few guidelines. I was forced to go out of my comfort zone and design projects that I felt met the expectations of the program. Following the many examples of other women within leadership positions in JLT, I was able to design events and even partner with a city-wide event to target childhood obesity.

After that success, I had more confidence to accept larger placements within JLT. I went on to co-chair the American Girl Fashion Show where I learned an entirely new skill set ranging from organizing seven fashion shows (filled with 130 preteen girls and their moms),

to securing sponsorships and auction items to managing teams of volunteers.

I have been able to transfer all of the skills that I have learned through JLT into other projects within the community. I now have the confidence, contacts and ability to organize large events which will benefit other organizations.

I will always be grateful for the opportunities and support I have received through the JLT framework and its members.




Zarrow Center for Art & Education Opens Doors

On May 15, JLT and the Gilcrease Museum, along with the University of Tulsa, celebrated the grand opening of the

The three-story Zarrow Center spans 18,000 square feet and has been renovated to include classrooms, art studios, gallery space and a reception area for public and private events
