CELEBRATING 95 YEARS OF WOMEN

For 95 years, the Junior League of Tulsa (JLT) has provided volunteer leadership in more than 100 community projects in the areas of healthcare, education, social services, child abuse prevention, homelessness, art appreciation, parenting resources, historic preservation, domestic violence prevention, childhood obesity, and much more. We are honored to continue our service to those in need through our mission to promote voluntarism, develop the potential of women, and improve our community.



1923 THE JUNIOR LEAGUE OF TULSA. INC. IS ORGANIZED

In 1923, JLT was established by twelve members. Mrs W. Albert Cook was the founder, and Mrs. Robert Ralph Lockwood (Francis Black) was the first president.

JLT ESTABLISHES TULSA'S FIRST CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

The original focus of the Junior League Convalescent Center was the caring of children who were crippled by and recovering from polio and sought a facility to aid in rehabilitation. In 1951, the facility was turned over to a community run board and renamed Children's Medical Center. The Children's Medical Center joined Hillcrest Medical Systems in 1994.

JLT JOINS THE WAR EFFORT

JLT joined the war effort by selling more than \$200,000 in war bonds, as well as furnishing day rooms at Camp Gruber where enlisted men could enjoy a "home away from home" while in training.



JLT SPONSORS THE HORSE SHOW

JLT raised over \$10,000 for the Children's Medical Center at the first Tulsa Charity Horse Show. As a direct result of JLT's sponsorship, the John E. and Lottie E. Mabee Foundation also donated \$10,000. The last Horse Show sponsored by JLT was in 1962.


JLT ESTABLISHES A SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN WITH COMMUNICATIVE DISORDERS ON THE TU CAMPUS

Following the success of a program designed to fund and administer hearing tests for school children, JLT provided volunteers and financial assistance to start the school on the University of Tulsa campus. The school is now known as The Mary Kay Chapman Center for Communicative Disorders.

JLT ADOPTS THE SOUTH HAVEN CHILDCARE CENTER

In 1970, JLT adopts a childcare center, and with various cooperating groups, provides volunteer services, financial aid, and curriculum. Two JLT members write "Help," a nationally recognized curriculum for Day Care Centers.

JLT FUNDS CAN AS A 4-YEAR PROJECT

Developed in 1986, the Child Abuse Network was a partnership between JLT, Tulsa Pediatric Society, BA and Tulsa Police Departments, Tulsa DHS Child Welfare, the DA's office, and the Sheriff's office. In 1988, the Child Abuse Network was incorporated and funded by the Junior League of Tulsa as a four-year project.

JLT DEVELOPS TULSA HISTORY CURRICULUM

The Tulsa Historical Society approaches JLT to develop a third-grade Tulsa history curriculum. Thousands of volunteer hours and three years of researching, writing, rewriting, and editing result in "Tulsa History A-Z," a resource that is still in use today.

TODAY

JLT continues to train and engage more than 600 women to serve as Tulsa's most effective volunteers. Last year, JLT members volunteered approximately 45,000 hours through JLT projects. We continue to provide leadership, development, and trained volunteers in our community in the areas of arts education, female incarceration, and food insecurity.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

COMMUNITY FOOD BANK OF EASTERN OKLAHOMA

Working alongside the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma, the JLT Food Bank Committee serves community dinners at local schools. The bi-monthly events provide families and teachers a comfortable and relaxed setting in which to build relationships that strengthen their community. At Hawhorne Elementary, committee members also helped facilitate Literacy Night with school faculty and staff. At Penn Elementary, members served dinner and hosted Technology Night and the Winter Festival where students created over 100 gingrbread houses.





STREET SCHOOL CULINARY CLUB

Junior League of Tulsa partners with Street School to teach cooking classes for high school students participating in the school's Culinary Club. Classes focus on affordable and nutritious meal options and take place in both classroom and kitchen settings. Members of the committee recently took the club members on a tour and demonstration at The Vault Restaurant, and a kitchen tour at Celebrity Restaurant followed by a discussion about what makes a good restaurant employee. Committee volunteers also provided support for the Club's pancake breakfast, which helped Street School raise money for The United Way.

IMPACT

Members of the Impact Committee plan and complete "done in a day" projects for a variety of community partners who meet our issue focus of ending the cycle of poverty. These members served as the front line to forge relationships between JLT and new community partners. Recent projects include providing planning and support for two New Hope Christmas Parties, a Palmer Continuum Care Christmas Party, Out of the Darkness Walk for American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, Dancing with the Tulsa Stars benefitting San Miguel Middle School, Coats for Kids Drive in conjunction with the Arabian Horse Show, and Operation Hope Prison Ministry. Members also sorted donations for DVIS and prepared swag bags for its employees.





FOOD ON THE MOVE

Members of the Food on the Move Committee provide support and assistance with programming for Food on the Move's mobile grocery initiative. Food on the Move endeavors to improve access to fresh fruits and vegetables for those in food insecure areas of Tulsa, as well as to distribute information about available community resources. In addition to helping distribute fresh produce at Food on the Move's monthly mobile grocery, the STEM Expo, and other events, committee members are tasked with creating a comfortable and fun atmosphere in which attendees can shop and build relationships.

HAWTHORNE 2ND GRADE ART

Through bi-monthly art classes for second grade students at Hawthorne Elementary, the Hawthorne 2nd Grade Art Committee serves children who would otherwise be unable to participate in art programs due to lack of funding. Members provide a fun and creative outlet for students and provide the children an opportunity to work on motor skills and self expression in a creative manner.





PHILBROOK MYMUSEUM MOBILE

Partnering with the Philbrook Museum of Art, members of the Philbrook MyMuseum Mobile Committee provided educational enrichment to children unable to visit the museum by taking the experience of Philbrook on the road to those receiving treatment at Saint Francis Children's Hospital. Committee members offered no-cost resources to patients and their families, encouraging them to learn more about the visual arts through a fun and creative outlet while they were experiencing significant medical issues and/ or other stressors.

POETIC JUSTICE

The Poetic Justice program provides writing workshops focused on voice, hope, and the power of change to incarcerated women. Members of the Poetic Justice Committee share their love of writing and help participants express themselves through creative writing. By assisting Poetic Justice in providing a therapeutic and educational writing experience to incarcerated women at the Tulsa County Jail, members are positive role models and mentors for women in the program.





RESONANCE CENTER FOR WOMEN: CHOOSING TO CHANGE

As program partners of Resonance's Choosing to Change re-entry support program, committee members provide incarcerated women at Turley Residential Center with social enrichment opportunities to assist in their transition back to society and the workforce. Volunteers plan and implement enrichment opportunities for women, including high quality mentoring, social relationship building activities, and opportunities to learn and participate in safe and healthy hobbies.

RESONANCE CENTER FOR WOMEN: TAKE 2 RESTAURANT

Members of the Take 2 Committee provide quality mentorship and healthy social activities for women transitioning from incarceration into employment at Resonance Center for Women's Take 2 Restaurant. Take 2 employs women who have recently been released from incarceration and are transitioning to a productive and drugfree lifestyle. These women work in the downtown restaurant, which serves breakfast and lunch on weekdays, and live in a three-bedroom loft apartment above the restaurant. Committee volunteers plan and host activities such as game nights, art projects, and shared meals.





TULSA CITY-COUNTY LIBRARY

In partnership with the Tulsa City-County Library, JLT members provide support for the Intergalactic Spaceport and Emporium by assisting with the development of processes and volunteers, and the implementation of student support programs at Tulsa's Central Library. Based on the 826 National model, the Spaceport center includes a creative writing and tutoring center operated in conjunction with an "out of this world" themed retail store. Profits of the store helped fund the center and it's programming.



THE ASSOCIATION OF JUNIOR LEAGUES INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE RECAP

Voting Delegates were busy at this year's Annual Business Meeting held during AJLI's 97th Annual Conference, May 2-4, 2019 in Denver. After a year of dialogue and much great work by the Seat at the Table Task Force, delegates approved an Operational Policy amendment incorporating a new "Rapid Response Process" to the current AJLI External Resolutions Process allowing AJLI to respond quickly to a current event that aligns with work leagues are already doing.

In addition to open and rich discussions, delegates passed three Advisory Resolutions. JLT, together with the Junior Leagues of Washington, DC and Jackson, Mississipi co-sponsored the first of the three resolutions and JLT President, Mary Beth Nesser, participated in its presentation to the delegation. The resolution advises

the AJLI Board of Directors to research and address financial barriers which may impede joining or maintaining membership at the international and local levels.

The second resolution advises the AJLI Board to consider removing Article II (Geographic Areas) from the AJLI Bylaws. The third advisory resolution asks the Board to consider revising the AJLI Mission Statement to better emphasize the leadership potential of women.

During the AJLI Annual Conference, JLT President, Mary Beth Nesser, was selected to serve as a member of the nominating committee for the Presidents of Large Leagues (POLL). Members of the nominating committee serve a 2-year placement and select the annual leadership for POLL which consists of 48 of the largest Junior Leagues across the international organization.



TEA SPOTLIGHT

The Junior League of Tulsa (JLT) prepares its members to improve the Tulsa community through volunteer service and continues to leave a legacy of women leaders. In 2016, JLT established a Training, Education, and Achievement (TEA) Committee to provide specific opportunities for members to develop new skills, learn about new ways to help the Tulsa community and recognize and steward future women leaders. Active and provisional members are required to attend one hour of TEA training each year. Throughout the past two years, more than fifteen different TEA trainings were offered on a variety of topics from developing your personal brand to disability etiquette.



Jessica Degginger attended her first TEA as a provisional member in the fall of 2018, entitled Building All Children. "I learned something new and valuable to our Tulsa community about encouraging childhood development and breaking the cycle of intergenerational poverty," remarked Jessica. The George Kaiser Family

Foundation presented their Birth Through Eight Strategy for Tulsa and encouraged attendees to participate in Reading Partners Tulsa as a volunteer and to encourage literacy with our youth.

One TEA session was offered specifically to members of finance and fundraising committees entitled Making the Ask. This session focused on asking for donations and soliciting sponsorships. Active member Julia Bond served on the Donor Development Committee, attended the workshop, and said, "As someone with no previous fundraising experience, this training was so helpful! It took something I previously perceived as scary and difficult and turned it into something I thought could be fun and that I could excel in. I love Junior League's investment in the growth of their members."

Another TEA offering focused on disability etiquette. Lori Mathis from The Center for Individuals with Physical Challenges and Krissan Diaz and Torrel Miles from Ability Resources

presented the program. This opportunity was particularly interesting for members as disability is the largest majority group anyone can join at any time. JLT member, Juell Homco attended the session and commented that the speakers were very engaging. "We learned about amazing resources in Tulsa that I was previously unaware of in addition to etiquette that can be applied immediately in our lives." While the speakers focused primarily on disability etiquette, they also educated attendees about local resources to help if and when members or their families may need assistance.

The Junior League of Tulsa is committed to promoting voluntarism, developing the potential of women and improving communities through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers. The TEA committee will continue to inspire JLT members by offering a variety of sessions to develop new skills, increase awareness of social issues, and become more effective community volunteers.

Dr. Brenda Llloyd-Jones is a past president and sustaining member of JLT, and in 2018 she was honored with Leadership Tulsa's Paragon Award for her work with The Mothers Group Inc., a nonprofit organization comprised of women in the Tulsa area who are dedicated to making a positive difference in the lives of children by advancing the importance of education, human diversity, and family interaction. The Paragon Award is given to a Leadership Tulsa graduate who has made a lasting impact through a history of service. Dr. Lloyd-Jones founded the group in 1988 and kicked off its signature event in 1989. The Santa Community Project is a widely acclaimed annual educational event which features a black Santa and Mrs. Claus who promote children's education, books, and reading. Born

out of a desire to address the statewide issue of children who scored below the 'basic' level on national reading tests, this event has grown year over year, reaching volunteers and participants from diverse backgrounds, with a shared desire to enrich the lives of Tulsa's youth.

JLT is also proud to acknowledge Liz Brolick, a past president and sustaining member of JLT and CEO of Switchgear Search and Recruiting. Switchgear is a leader in women's growth and empowerment within the workplace. Under Brolick's innovative leadership, Switchgear Search and Recruiting was selected as the Corporate Champion for the 2019 YWCA Women of the Year-Pinnacle Awards. Each year, the Tulsa YWCA, in partnership with the Mayor's Commission on the Status of Women, selects six women and one business for their outstanding accomplishments and impact on women empowerment and the Tulsa community.

2018 Mentorship Luncheon

The Junior League of Tulsa's 6th annual Mentorship Luncheon was held on January 25, 2018, at Southern Hills Country Club. Guests gathered to hear featured keynote speaker Carol Scott, President of the Association of Junior Leagues International (AJLI) and CEO of the Children's Discovery Museum of the Desert in Rancho Mirage, California.
